GOALS

Climate change poses one of the greatest challenges to rural development in West Africa: Crop yields are declining, soils are eroding, and access to clean water is becoming increasingly scarce. Agricultural enterprises are particularly affected, often lacking climate-resilient technologies, financing, and advisory services. This is where WAC-SRT steps in: by training professionals in sustainable rural development and locally adapted technologies in renewable energy and water management. Additionally, the initiative aims to promote innovative approaches in agricultural production, agribusiness, and marketing. WAC-SRT builds bridges between urban and rural areas as well as between Anglophone and Francophone regions, addressing development issues that affect many countries in Sub-Saharan Africa.

KEY ACTIONS

WAC-SRT establishes interdisciplinary teaching and research programmes at its partner universities in Ghana and Niger. These include master's programmes in sustainable rural development, agricultural economics, and development management. In addition, WAC-SRT offers the doctoral programme "Sustainable Rural Transformation" as well as master's and PhD programmes in "Economic Development Policy". The degree programmes combine social sciences with natural and engineering sciences, thereby promoting integrated solutions for rural transformation processes.
